Introduction

The Feast Centre for Indigenous STBBI Research invites members of the Feast Centre to nominate graduate Master's or PhD students conducting Indigenous STBBI research in any one of the four pillars of health science (clinical, epidemiology/public health, basic science and social science) for a Feast Centre Graduate Scholarship. A key objective of the Feast Centre is to provide funding, mentorship, and training to support the development of expertise in Indigenous STBBI health research that is grounded in Indigenous knowledges, methods, and decolonizing approaches. This scholarship will provide recipients with one year of Feast Centre funding to support their development as Indigenous STBBI researchers.

Successful recipients of this award will be supported by experts in the field of Indigenous STBBI research, a national Council of Elders, community partners and by Feast Centre staff. The Feast Centre is committed to supporting award recipients to produce and expand research and scholarship in the field of Indigenous STBBI research that uses Indigenous methods in order to develop Indigenous solutions.

Value and Duration

The Feast Centre is providing one year of potentially renewable scholarships to four Master's students, and two PhD students to conduct Indigenous STBBI research in their field of study. Funds will not be automatically renewable but will require submission of a further application in the second year of the project. Recipients will not be funded beyond two years.

Each scholarship, whether Master's or PhD, is to support Indigenous STBBI research in one or more of the four pillars of health research mentioned above.

Background

The Feast Centre for Indigenous STBBI Research is a partnership between McMaster University and CAAN Communities, Alliances and Networks, and is affiliated with the McMaster Indigenous Research Institute (MIRI) and the Aboriginal HIV/AIDS Community-Based Research Collaborative Centre (the AHA Centre). Through our collaborative approach, the Feast Centre has representation from Indigenous and allied scholars, community organizations, Indigenous people with lived experience of HIV/AIDS and other STBBI and diverse and traditional knowledge holders.

The Feast Centre privileges the use of community-based research approaches that draw on Indigenous knowledges and adopts a decolonizing orientation to shape methodological approaches. Of particular focus is the use of culturally relevant data collection in addition to analytic procedures that create relationships and support Indigenous autonomy to respond to STBBI in ways consistent with diverse cultural traditions. This includes supporting research that is strengths-based that contributes to the health and wellbeing of Indigenous communities. Such actions include - but are not limited to - understanding cultural sources of resilience, focusing on social determinants of health, and exploring other faces of experiential knowledge (e.g., multigenerational Indigenous knowledges, cultural protocols, etc.). Towards this end, the Feast Centre emphasizes the four pillars of health research (basic, clinical, epidemiology/public health and social science) to maximize the effectiveness of activities.

Eligibility

Applicants must be nominated by a Feast Centre team member to be eligible for this opportunity. If the Feast Centre team member is not connected to the academic institution in which the applicant studies, linkages will be made with the applicant's supervisor. Applicants must be eligible to work in Canada, must be enrolled in a Canadian academic institution and must be in good academic standing.

Applicants be registered in a Canadian Masters or PhD program with a significant research component. A significant research component is considered to be original, autonomous research that leads to the completion of a thesis, major research project, dissertation, and/or scholarly publication that is merit/expert-reviewed at the institutional level as a requirement for completion of the program.

Note: Applicants who have applied but have not yet been accepted to their respective programs are eligible to be nominated for this opportunity. Successful applicants will receive conditional offers until they are able to provide proof of enrollment.

Expectations

Students will be required to:

- Construct an individualized research plan including a timeline and activities that they will undertake to increase their capacity in Indigenous STBBI research. This plan will outline how the student will undertake research development, contribute to an ongoing study, and/or engage with a range of community/stakeholders to create and implement a knowledge translation plan.
- Identify an academic advisor with whom they will work closely throughout the duration of the research project.
- Check-in at least once per term with Feast Centre to discuss overall progress with respect to the research plan and to review benchmark attainments.

- Communicate regularly with relevant supports as identified by the student and the Feast Centre. This could be with community partners, Elders, or researchers in the field of Indigenous STBBI research.
- Acknowledge support from The Feast Centre for Indigenous STBBI Research in any publication or presentation of research work.
- Participate in a yearly career development or mentorship session with Feast Centre team members or Elders, with support from the Feast Centre.

Students will be encouraged or invited to:

- Participate in Feast Centre opportunities such as the Land Based Learning events and the Learning Series.
- Develop KTE activities/resources related to their research topic in partnership with the Feast
- Submit an abstract to present research findings at but not limited to the CAAN Communities, Networks and Alliances Wise Practices Conference or other relevant conferences upon completion of the project
- Submit an article for publication consideration.

Application Process

All applications are to be submitted electronically using the instructions below:

NB: There are two deadlines for this scholarship opportunity. Applicants are encouraged to submit Attachment B and C for the first deadline to participate in the iterative review process.

All application materials must be submitted (or resubmitted) as one package by the final deadline.

The first review deadline (optional): April 9th 2023

The Feast Centre will provide an iterative review process for Graduate Scholarship applications. Applicants have the opportunity to ask for advice and support during application development and also after the applications are submitted for first round reviews. Applicants are encouraged to seek advice and support from Feast Centre team members while developing their application. Applicants who submit for the first draft deadline will be provided feedback on Attachment C of their application, "Outline of Research Interest (Master's)" or "Outline of Proposed Research (PhD)," from the review committee, prior to the final application deadline. This iterative process will provide an opportunity for submission of robust, clear, and rigorous applications. The first round of reviews may result in questions from the review committee and applicants will be offered the opportunity to address those questions for the second round of reviews.

The second and final deadline: May 9th 2023

The second deadline is the final application deadline. Applications that come in after this deadline will not be eligible for the iterative review process and will be provided feedback after the completed review. This second round of reviews is the final round, and eligibility for Graduate Scholarships will be determined in this round. Late or incomplete proposals past the final application deadline will not be considered. It is the applicant's responsibility to ensure that applications are complete, and that all information is accurate.

Application Evaluation and Selection Process

All applications will be reviewed by a review committee from the Feast Centre team. Recipients will be selected based on the quality of their application, including their research plan, community engagement strategy, use of Indigenous and decolonizing methods, grades, and reference letters. Successful applicants will be notified via email regarding their award status.
